
Mathematics


We will continue to learn about numbers to 5 and begin to learn about bigger numbers.

- Subitise confidently to 4.
- Link the number symbol with it's cardinal number value to 5 and write the numerals accurately.
- Understand that 'one more than/one less than' relationships between consecutive numbers.
- Compare numbers using reasoning and problem solving to articulate their answers.
- Have an understanding of numbers up to 7, including composition of each number.
- Automatically recall number bonds 0—5 and some up to 10.
- Talk about 2D and 3D shapes, manipulating shapes to develop special reasoning.
- Continue, copy and create repeating patterns.
- Compare length, weight and capacity.














Personal, Social and Emotional Development

We will develop our understanding of ourselves as individuals and continue to build strong relationships with familiar adults and peers.

- To understand and explain what makes themselves a valuable individual.
- Identify and moderate their own feelings socially and emotionally.
- Understand how their own actions can affect the feelings of others.
- Show resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge.
- Manage their own needs—personal hygiene.
- Know and talk about the different factors that support their overall health and well-being: sensible amounts of screen time, having a good sleep routine, being a safe pedestrian.
- Build constructive and respectful relationships with a range of adults.
- Think about the perspectives of others.

Communication and Language

We will listen to our peers and familiar adults in our class and talk about relevant topics offering own ideas.

- Understand how to listen carefully and why listening is important.
- Listen and talk about stories to build familiarity and understanding.
- Describe events in some detail relevant to stories and
- Use new vocabulary throughout the day, in relation to topic, current events and in different contexts.
- Articulate their ideas and thoughts in well-formed sentenc-
- Connect one idea to another using connectives.
- Retell the story, once they have developed a deep familiarity with the text: some as exact repetition and some in their own words.
- Use talk to work out problems and organise thinking.

Literacy

We will continue to develop our growing phonics knowledge to support our early reading and early writing skills.

- Re-read books to build up confidence in word reading, fluency, understanding and enjoyment.
- Read some letter groups that represent one sound and say sounds for them.
- Begin to read common exception words in line with Little Wandle Letters and Sounds Revised.
- Read simple phrases and sentences made up of words with known letter-sound correspondences.
- Begin to form lower case and capital letters correctly.
- Spell words by identifying the sounds, locate these sounds on a sound mat and then write sounds to form a simple word, caption or sentence.
- Re-read what they have written to check is makes sense.
- Continue to recognise simple punctuations and say their meaning:
 - full stops
 - question marks

Expressive Arts and Design

We will explore a range of music genres.

- Watch and talk about dance and performance art, expressing feelings and their response.
- Listen attentively, move to and talk about music, expressing their feelings and response.
- Sing as part of a group.
- Develop story lines in pretend play.

We will use our creativity to explore a range of materials to express ourselves.

- Explore, use and refine a variety of artistic effects to express their own ideas and feelings.
- Return to and bulk on their previous learning, refining ideas and developing their ability to represent them.
- Create collaboratively, sharing ideas, resources and skills.
- Use drawing to represent ideas like movement and noise.
- Draw with increasing complexity and detail.

Physical Development

We will continue to learn and participate in activities to develop our fundamental abilities with both our gross and fine motor skills.

- Revise and refine our fundamental movement skills.
- Progress to a more fluent style of moving, with developing control and grace.
- Develop overall body strength, co-ordination, balance and agility in order to engage successfully with future PE sessions.
- Confidently and safely use a range of large and small apparatus indoors and outdoors, alone and within a group.
- Combine different movements with ease and fluency.
- Develop competency and confidence, precision and accuracy when engaging in activities involving a ball.
- Further develop the skills needed to manage the school day: lining up and queuing.
- Develop the ability to hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing, including the foundations of a fluent handwriting style.
- Develop small motor skills to use a range of tools competently.

Understanding the World

We will explore under the sea habitats and discover the creatures from the ocean..

- Draw a simple map.
- Explore the natural world around them.
- Describe what they see, hear and feel whilst outside.
- Recognise some environments that are different to our own.
- Understand the effects of the changing seasons in the natural world around them.
- Plant seeds and care for growing plants.
- Understand the life cycle of a plant and an animal from the ocean.
- Comment on images of familiar situations in the past.
- Compare and contrast characters form stories, including figures from the past.
- Recognise some similarities and differences between life in this country and life in other countries.
- Understand that some places are special to members of their community.
